WHEREAS, on February 6, 2024, the Planning Commission issued a recommendation regarding the proposed zoning amendment; and

NOW, THEREFORE, the Council of the City of Binghamton, duly convened in regular session, does hereby ordain as follows:

Section 1. That the Code of the City of Binghamton, *Chapter 410, 410-19 Accessory and Building Uses, Subsection 410-19 (M), Residential Amenity and Assembly Spaces*, is hereby amended to clarify the existing language as follows:

410-19 M. Residential Amenity and Assembly Spaces

When located in residential or mixed-use buildings as accessories to residential use, amenity spaces including fitness centers, common kitchens, and computer rooms, and assembly spaces including lounges, theaters, and billiard rooms, shall be regulated as follows:

- 1) Congregate Living facilities, Multiple-Unit Dwellings, and other properties containing more than 12 total bedrooms shall not contain any assembly spaces or other amenity spaces that are accessory to the residential use below grade, with the exception of structured parking, laundry facilities, and/or storage facilities. Any below-grade laundry or storage facilities shall be proportioned and constructed such that they do not allow an occupancy limit above 10 persons per partitioned space.
- In Congregate Living facilities, Multiple-Unit Dwellings, and properties containing more than 12 total bedrooms, the occupancy limit of any above-grade residential amenity or assembly space shall not exceed 25 persons.
- 3) The occupant load factors for amenity spaces are as follows:

- a. Above and/or below grade laundry rooms shall not exceed 15 square feet per person.
- b. Above and/or below grade storage rooms shall not exceed 7 square feet per person.
- c. Above and/of below grade storage rooms shall not exceed 7 square feet per person.
 4) Notwithstanding the above, the actual Occupancy Limit shall be determined by the Fire Marshal based on square footage, intended use, and furnishings/equipment, not to exceed the limits above.

A RESOLUTION REQUESTING NEW YORK STATE SENATOR LEA WEBB AND ASSEMBLY MEMBER DONNA LUPARDO FOR INTRODUCTION OF HOME RULE LEGISLATION TO AMEND TAX LAW TO AUTHORIZE THE COLLECTION OF AN OCCUPANCY TAX IN THE CITY OF **BINGHAMTON**

WHEREAS, Section 1202 of the New York State Tax Law allows municipalities to adopt and amend local laws imposing a tax upon persons occupying hotel or motel rooms, bed and breakfast, and other tourist rental stay facilities; and

WHEREAS, the City is prepared and budgeted to implement this occupancy tax and seeks the support of the City's elected representatives in the New York State Senate and Assembly after discussion and acknowledgment by the City Council; and

WHEREAS, upon the introduction of legislation, the City of Binghamton will take further action to submit a home rule request pursuant to Article IX of the Constitution in support of legislation to authorize the City to implement a hotel and motel tax rate of up to five percent (5%) of the per-diem rental rate for each room;

NOW THEREFORE, the Council of the City of Binghamton, duly convened in regular session does hereby:

RESOLVE, that the City of Binghamton City Council finds that the implementation of a hotel and motel tax rate would benefit the City by providing additional revenues for the promotion of tourism, cultural programs, parks and recreation, and the critical infrastructure and capital improvements necessary to support those items; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the City Council hereby requests that New York State Senator Lea Webb and Assembly Member Donna Lupardo, as elected representatives of the City of Bighamton, introduce legislation to authorize the City to adopt a local law giving the authority to implement the hotel and motel tax rate at a rate of up to five percent (5%) of the per-diem rental rate for each room; and be it further RESOLVED, that the City Council requests the bill be drafted to include additional language clarifying that for the purposes of this particular section of law, definition of the terms "hotel" or "motel" are to mean and include any facility providing lodging on an overnight basis and shall include those facilities designated and commonly known as "bed and breakfast" and "tourist" facilities; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the City Council requests the bill include additional language for the purpose as to enable authorized local law(s) enacted by the City to provide that any tax imposed shall be paid by the person liable therefor to the owner of the hotel or motel room occupied or to the person entitled to be paid the rent or charge for the hotel or motel room occupied for and on account of the City of Binghamton imposing the tax and that such owner or person entitled to be paid the rent or charge shall be liable for the collection and payment of the tax; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the City Council requests the bill include additional language relating to the deposit of revenues resulting from the imposition of the tax be added with the purpose as to authorize the City to retain the necessary revenue to defer the expense of the City in administering such tax and the balance of such revenues shall be allocated to the promotion of tourism, cultural programs, parks and recreation, and the critical infrastructure and capital improvements necessary to support those activities, including all financial costs and obligations incurred by the city related to the creation of such events and activities as so determined by the City of Binghamton City Council; and be it further

RESOVLED, that the City Clerk is hereby directed to forward certified copies of this resolution to New York State Senator Lea Webb and Assembly Member Donna Lupardo.
