6:00	Public Works	Dundon	RL/Topic RL 24-95 A Resolution for a Clean City Initiative • Solak: Points out Binghamton is not cleaner due to usage of blue bags, objects to middleman providing low-quality bags. States that ≈30 years ago, decision was made to free up \$800k in budget. Likens situation to requiring purchase of a City fire alarm for Fire Department service. Cost has been shifted from property owners to renters. System described as "you pay for what you use", but new cost exists for individuals with no extra costs associated with garbage pickup prior. Believes it is Mayor's obligation to solve issue as entity responsible for creating City annual budget. Recommends following Johnson City's lead — single sanitation bill to households which covers water, sewer, and sanitation costs.
