Adds that new language would be in alignment with statewide legal requirement	27	Nate Hotchkiss, Councilmember
6:20	Planning	Hotchkiss	RL 24-144: A Resolution authorizing the sale of 35-41 Charlotte Street to Charles Ackerman for \$1 • Hotchkiss: States that purpose of proposal is to build ultra lowincome housing with innovative private sector approach to address homelessness crisis • CM Cavanaugh: Asks what current state of parcels is; Hotchkiss answers one had a fire which resulted in demolition – no current plans for any parcels • Ackerman: Plans to build units at 150sqft. apiece to accommodate renters who only receive DSS rental assistance amount of \$401/month. 	will not be seeking any other

	money, nonprofits, etc.). Outlines	
	each unit as having private	
	bathroom (2 units on 1 st floor	
	would be ADA-compliant,	
	remainder would accommodate	
	wheelchair access), kitchenette,	
	front door, window, HVAC, etc.	
	Units would allow individuals that	
	currently have no choice in	
	housing other than to be	
	houseless to gain stability, rather	
	than using rooming houses or	
	emergency shelter. Notes that	
	County is spending \$7mil on	
	motels for emergency housing	
	CM Middleton: Asks if Ackerman	
	would consider working with	
	non-profit for management of	
	property; Ackerman answers yes.	
	States that purpose of project	
	moving through private sector is	
	to help production go faster than	
	public sector to address crisis.	
	Hopes to do master lease with	
	non-profit once building is	
	complete and feels certain that

	online. Notes that he has ability
	to manage property himself if
	necessary; doesn't want to delay
	production or drive up costs by
	bringing in outside stakeholders
	early in development
	CM Porter: Asks if Ackerman
	intends to do build similar
	projects in other communities;
	Ackerman says yes, if it works –
	reiterates that he is holding all
	the financial investment risk and
	states that typical real estate
	investment would produce much
	lower returns
	Ackerman: Cites approximate
	building cost at \$1.35mil, needs
	land to start any work. Would be
	agreeable to deed
	restriction/claw back provision
	and will be putting property back
	on tax rolls. Emphasizes need for
	this project, as everyone
	deserves respect and shelter
	CM Hotchkiss: Asks about
	outlined parking spots in
	blueprint; Ackerman responds
	that part of zoning variance will
	be request to reduce parking
	requirements by half
	CM Porter: Asks about potential
