Hello Mr. Rogers,

I have a public comment to submit for today's City Council Business Meeting:

"My name is Noah Lennon. I am a resident of Binghamton and I ask you to approve RL21-230, authorizing the mayor to accept the Green Innovation Program grant money. Allowing the development of bioretention planters and street trees are not only helpful for carbon sequestration and beautification, they will also mitigate flooding and naturally filter the stormwater that is currently polluting the Susquehanna and Chenango Rivers. They can also reduce the urban heat island effect, a phenomenon from which Binghamton is not immune. I hope that this project is just the beginning of Binghamton's green infrastructure initiatives, and that the city continues to seek funding to create green spaces, especially in unused areas such as abandoned buildings and parking lots. The amount of greenery in an area is positively related to property values, making it important for environmental justice that low-income areas be considered for the future of green infrastructure in the city. The continuation of this process is crucial for more of the city to experience the benefits of stormwater management, clean water and soil, environmental justice, and a beautiful landscape."
